Information for internship hosts about the internship course KP1510 (15 credits) in the Bachelor's program Culture (180 credits)

The Bachelor program Culture

The Bachelor program Culture is a three-year program education that leads to a bachelor's degree in Cultural Science. The program consists of a broad education about culture as a policy area and as part of society, about theoretical perspectives and analytical methods, and with skills courses in writing and museum knowledge, cultural management and entrepreneurship, and the implementation of a cultural projects and. The program also includes one semester with an optional specialization within a cultural science subject.

Internship – what?

During the fall semester of the final third year of the program, an internship course is included where the students do their internship at workplaces for eight weeks (w. 40 – w. 47). To be eligible for the internship course, the students have more than two years of university education behind them and are well prepared for qualified work tasks. These can, for example, consist of surveys, investigations, evaluations and information tasks, action plans to smaller projects or arrangements such as an exhibition or educational activity, a text production or something else.

The general knowledge and skills that the students on the Bachelor program in Culture have acquired mean that they can also complete their internship at workplaces outside the cultural field. For both the students and their internships, the skills the students have acquired during their education can mean exciting opportunities to test cultural science competencies in more and new work areas than specifically the cultural area.

Internship – how?

During their internship period, the students need to have the opportunity to be given a good insight into the various tasks that are part of the daily work at the workplace. According to the syllabus for the program course in practice, the students must also carry out some form of independent task during their internship period at the internship site. At the internship site, the student needs a contact person in the form of an internship host. Together with the internship host, the student agrees on which tasks are included in the internship and which form of independent task is to be completed, which is written down in a simple template for an internship plan. The internship plan specifies the tasks that are included during the internship and how the student will be given the opportunity to solve their internship task. When the internship plan is ready, it is signed by the internship host and the student, and the student

sends it to the teacher responsible for the course for approval. The internship plan should preferably be completed by the end of the spring semester before the internship period during the fall semester and at the very latest at the beginning of the internship. If changes occur, the practice plan can be revised. After the internship period, the internship host signs a certificate that the internship has been completed according to the content of the internship plan. The student then submits this certificate to the seminar leader at the final examination seminar of the internship course at the university.

Internship – when?

The internship period extends from week 40 to week 47 in 2024. During these eight weeks, the student will participate in the daily activities of the workplace during regular working hours at the workplace if no other agreements have been made.

After the internship period, the student compiles a written internship report during week 48 which is presented orally during a final examination seminar at the University of Gothenburg week 49. In the internship report, the student is expected to describe the internship site and the duties performed, and to reflect on acquired cultural science competences and their relevance in working life. To the report, the students must also attach examples of the independent task or tasks that they completed during their internship period.
